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Vernon, an African American soldier, writes some friends in the United States:

"April 30 1946

I'm in a bit of trouble now. I was to leave for home on the 23rd of January. I heard that I was going, so I went out and got pretty drunk. I came to in the hospital with a fratured ankle and a broken fibula bone. A couple of days later an investigating officer came to the hospital and told me that I had been in a stolen jeep and that a little girl had been killed. No, I didn't steal the jeep, in fact I didn't know I was in one. I stayed in the hospital a little of two months and now I'm being held for court-martial...I will write you again as soon as the court-martial is over. Vernon"

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- Vernon made it through the Second World War but when he passed away is unknown.
